

# Design Professionals Roundtable Recap: Contracts 201: From Provisions to Practice—Advanced Contracting for Design Professionals

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On August 5, 2026, MG+M The Law Firm hosted the latest installment of its Design Professionals Roundtable series, "Contracts 201: From Provisions to Practice—Advanced Contract Strategies for Design Professionals."

Led by MG+M Partners [Kelly Martin Malone](#), [Scott Winikow](#), and [Steve Willig](#), the session built on the foundational concepts introduced in the firm's earlier Contracts 101 program, diving deeper into the complex contract issues design professionals face in practice.

## Key Takeaways

- + **Indemnity**—Push for negligence-based indemnity only (not "any claim"), avoid day-one defense obligations, and flow indemnity down to sub-consultants.
- + **Limitations of liability**—Cap exposure by time, dollar amount (aggregate, not per-claim), and scope (only what you control)—these terms only bind contracting parties.
- + **Insurance**—Broad indemnity or heightened standard-of-care clauses can push you outside coverage; E&O policies don't cover contractual liability or liquidated damages, and defense costs erode limits.
- + **Consequential damages**—Get a mutual waiver (lost profits, reputational harm, etc.) since these claims are more often made against design professionals than by them.
- + **Liquidated damages**—Try to delete entirely; if unavoidable, tie them strictly to your own breach and cap them within your liability limit.
- + **Waiver of subrogation**—Include it and flow it down to sub-consultants; it prevents insurer-vs-insurer lawsuits and doesn't affect your premiums.
- + **Termination/suspension**—If possible, try to negotiate termination for convenience provisions over "for cause," and negotiate payment for work performed, and licensing terms on upon termination.
- + **Ownership of instruments of service**—Keep ownership of your drawings; grant a payment-contingent license instead of transferring rights outright.
